Most Adventist members who attend church have heard of Adventist Community Services (ACS). However, little is known about the ministry and its potential impact on the local communities in which we live and serve. Often when we hear of ACS, we think of disaster relief or what used to be called "ingathering", but ACS is so much more.

In an urban setting it might be a soup kitchen or care bags for the homeless. Yet in any setting it could be raking leaves for a shut-in, or fixing someone's porch, helping after the death of a loved one, or even helping to pay a utility bill.

The beauty of community services for the local church and community is that it can be as broad and creative as the local church team running it. If you go to www.communityservices. org it lists the following areas of ministry: Community Development, Disaster Response, Emotional and Spiritual Care, Older Adult Ministry, Tutoring and Mentoring and Young Adult Emergency Services (YES) Corps.

If you do a deep dive into the 7 Pillars of ACS Ministry, you will see it covers most of the areas of ministry we actively participate in when engaging with the community. Within each of the areas listed above, there are sub-categories that help each church define and elaborate on the possibilities under the ACS Banner.

The official mission is stated this way: "Adventist Community Services is the official community outreach ministry of the Seventh-day Adventist Church











in the North American Division territories which comprises of the United States, Canada, Guam and Micronesia, and Bermuda. ACS serves the whole person, a concept known as holistic ministry whose mission is "Serving Communities in Christ's Name."

In this edition of the Alyeskan, we share how members are reaching out in their communities. We hope you are inspired to expand a current ministry or perhaps even launch a unique outreach to meet a need in the city or village where you live. As you and your local church develop ministry and outreach that connect directly with the community, also consider starting or expanding your local ACS Chapter. Whether it's tutoring, running a food pantry, helping victims of a house fire, Homeless or Young Adult Emergency Services, God has ordained you at this time in the place where you live to "let your light shine", so they can see Jesus in you!

We read Jesus' words in John 17 about how the body of Christ must be one and He even sets a standard for us to be perfectly united. But how? In a world full of racial division, how can we shine as bright lights for Jesus? How do we become an authentic witness and a faithful voice for racial unity within the Church and to those who are not in our community of faith?

In Latasha Morrison's New York Times Bestseller, *Be the Bridge: Pursuing God's Heart for Racial Reconciliation*, she prays, "Lord, come into our brokenness and our lives with your love that heals all. Consume our pride and replace it with humility and vulnerability. Allow us to make space for your correction and redemption. Allow us to bow down with humble hearts, hearts of repentance. Bind us together in true unity and restoration. Give us collective eyes to see our role in repairing what is broken." What a wonderful prayer.

Using Morrison's book and discussion guide, the Anchorage Northside Church has launched a new outreach to help get us unstuck by facilitating conversations that have the potential to heal racial divides, as we journey toward our ultimate goal of racial reconciliation.

Racial reconciliation is not political – it's biblical. In 2 Corinthians 5:18 Paul forcefully states that Christ "gave us the ministry of reconciliation". Our Lord knows the difficulties we face in our fractured world and He commissions us to be salt and light as we navigate

difficult conversations and work to build meaningful relationships.

The Bible describes racial unity as many differently shaped, differently functioning body parts coming together to form a single, unified body of Christ. This is our goal and, by God's grace, it is our sacred honor to do the necessary work to achieve this goal.

We desire God to be glorified. We want the church to be credible. We want Christians to develop biblical tools that empower us to be the bridge between people divided by racial and cultural differences.

BE THE BRIDGE

BAGS OF LOVE

Eleven years ago, the women of the Valdez church were encouraged by Jean Gobah, Alaska Conference Women's Ministry Director, and Dr. Ephriam Palmero, former Alaska Conference ACS Director, to identify and pursue an ongoing local community outreach project. The group soon discovered that locally and across the state there are children with unmet needs: children who need basic supplies when transitioning into a foster home or those who are living in a shelter. Many leave their homes without a toothbrush, comb or other basic personal items.

With this focus in mind, the Valdez group signed a charter membership with the international "It's My Very Own" Bags of Love. They chose the organization because of its proven plan for success and structure that would help with organization and long-term commitment. The "It's My Very Own" Bags of Love organization provides all the forms and necessary information to interface and work with State of Alaska Children Protection Service (CPS) representatives and as well as leaders from other non-profit organizations that work with children. Forms are provided for accepting corporate and individual donations of funds and items, document faithful stewardship and distribution of donations. Age-appropriate items are placed in each bag, maintaining consistency with its contents. Volunteers sew comforters, collect, purchase, and organize needed items and distribute as many as 12 bags to a single agency.

The Bags of Love program is designed for foster children ages 0-17 and are divided by specific age and gender. The most valued item is a home sewn comforter with a tag showing it was made by loving hearts in Valdez from the Adventist church. It is placed in the bottom of each homemade fabric bag along with basic personal care supplies and a travel-size pillow. All contents are new and it is such a joy to know the bags are ready and available when needed.

To fill the need for numerous requests from the shelter, ministry volunteers started making pillowcase bags and fleece blankets for the children. A pillowcase bag is quicker to make and the fleece blanket does not require any sewing.

Client information is confidential. All the agency needs to provide is the age and gender of the child. The Valdez church provides the requesting agency with a complete set of 12 bags to store at its facility with 24-hour access to distribute them at the agency's discretion. Bags are given to CPS and agencies at no cost with the understanding that the bag and its contents are to be given in its entirety to the child with nothing added or taken away.

The families are told the bag belongs to the child to whom it is given. Alaska social workers suggested we add two Continued on Page 14

Camp ministry with young people has been a long tradition in Alaska. The Alaska Mission Adventist History book by Nadine Hansen records pastors and church leaders taking groups of youth across lakes and into remote Alaska as early as 1940. Teaching, mentoring and discipling young people through the camping tradition has been embedded in the Adventist Christian orthopraxy.

In 2018, Alaska Camps' long-standing tradition of three resident camps in majestic and amazing locations, expanded to running day camps in remote villages in the Alaskan Bush. Alaska Camps has prioritized villages where Arctic Mission Adventure (AMA) workers live year-round. Generous AMA workers, along with curious and supportive villagers, came to participate in the first Alaska Camps' Ultimate Day Camps in the villages of Selawik, Nome and Bethel. Skeptical parents and

church members quickly warmed up to the energetic and Christ-centered staff. Afterwards, a parent commented that they couldn't wait till next year because of the positive impact it had on their child and the community.

Most day camps provide a variety of games, crafts, Bible stories, songs, food and just good ole'-fashioned fun. Each village has unique strengths that allows for creative options in each community that another village might not. For example, Dillingham has a school and gym, while Selawik has a river nearby; Bethel has a community recreation center and Nome has the Bering Sea. Regardless of the location or local benefits, the goal is to learn about God in a healthy, safe and highly engaging environment.

As the oversight director of both day and residential camps, as well as logistics

and details, it is always a blessing to hear stories from the staff when we debrief. An example of the positive impact of Ultimate Day Camps is when Alaska Camps' staff traveled to Utqiagvik. As camp ended to a conclusion, God came through in a mighty way.

Every day, without exception, the team was met with at least one—and often more—camper that was disruptive and ornery. It became so distracting, staff seriously considered if the camper should be allowed to return because their behavior was so egregious. However, after spending time in discussion and prayer, it was unanimously decided to encourage the camper to return each day. Not only did the unruly behavior stop, but the young person became attentive and by the end of the week was a completely transformed individual.





Camp is a place where kids feel like they belong while experiencing faith, fun and friendship. It is a place where year after year, and in every event, Jesus shows up in a powerful way to all involved. Thank you for your support of Alaska Youth Ministry and the Alaska Camps programs that make these types of impact most incredible.

POSTING


Re-opening plans need to be posted in a prominent area.

AMAZING GRACE ACADEMY

God's Hands In Our Community

One of the most important components of Adventist education is service. Amazing Grace Academy (AGA) has intentionally provided service opportunities for all its students over the years. Even though this school year has been challenging with the restrictions put in place due to the coronavirus pandemic, AGA has managed to continue providing service opportunities for its students.

For several years, AGA has held major service events which involve the entire school. One event is providing Thanksgiving gift boxes to community members in need which has been very successful. Student families and church members donate both food and money to buy food for families in need in the Matanuska-Susitna Valley area. The food is collected in the gym where students fill boxes with enough food for a hearty Thanksgiving meal and plenty of leftovers. After praying over each box, the packages are then delivered, with the help of the high school students, to the people who need them. Blessings abound not only to the ones who receive the food, but also to every student who helps provide it.



Another school-wide activity occurs around Christmas. Durina the annual Spirit Week, students are encouraged to donate one dollar each day for a shopping spree. On Friday morning, the students travel to the local Target store where they go shopping in groups which range in age from kindergarten through seniors. Each group is

given the same amount of money and encouraged to spend it on toys that they would enjoy receiving. While staff and parents are there to supervise and offer security, the students are the ones who make all the decisions about what to buy. The toys are brought back to the school, put on display and then handed over to a local service organization which provides Christmas gifts for children in foster care who may not have much of anything to call their own. The opportunity for kids to help kids is powerful and the Target Toy Drive is an event which is looked forward to with great anticipation each December.

In January, individual classrooms participate in a "Service Day" on the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday. During the morning hours, classes do age appropriate activities to help the community. Because of COVID-19, this year's activities were all done at the school. High school students helped Sleep in Heavenly Peace, an organization which provides beds for families who can't afford them. Wooden bunk beds are made with materials provided by local hardware stores and are made in an assembly line manner. By the end of




AGA students prepare blankets as part of the school community outreach program

the day, dozens of new beds have been built and are ready to be given to those in need.

Other projects this year included providing notes of thanks encouragement to first responders and nursing home residents, baking doggie treats for the local animal shelter, as well as making blankets and other projects for those who need help. These are just some of the service projects AGA does. In past years, students have chopped and stacked firewood, done yard clean-up and maintenance, helped sort clothing and other donations at a local thrift store, volunteered at a local food bank, and traveled to foreign countries on short-term mission trips. Each of these activities is designed to give the students the opportunity to help others and to make this helping attitude habitual.

TAKING IT TO THE STREETS

The Alaska Street Ministry of the Anchorage Hillside OMalley Church began in 2015 with the vision of Tony Pouesi, who was a resident at the Greater Works Living Center.

He would travel by bus to downtown Anchorage, hand out *Glow Tracts* and talk with folks about Jesus. I joined him and together with the vision our Lord provided, we began handing out water and sandwiches, praying with people, and giving them literature such as *Steps to Christ* and the *Power of Prayer*.

In the fall and winter months, the ministry collects clothing such as hats, socks, gloves, blankets and coats and drives around town to hand out the items to our friends in need. We eventually started providing soup and hot chocolate and now also distribute bags filled with hygiene items with every day necessities like toothpaste, toothbrushes, combs, tissues, deodorant, shampoo, soap, etc.

Several people have joined the group and the ministry would not be sustainable without the help, support, prayers and the donations of our brothers and sisters who have a heart for the homeless and those less fortunate.

This ministry has been such a blessing to those we have been able to pray with and minister to, but I always feel as if we are the ones who have been blessed to be the hands and feet of Jesus; to tell others there is a God who is alive and well and a King who loves them and is coming soon to bring us home.

The Alaska Street Ministry shirt that Tony designed and volunteers are delighted to wear says, "Bringing Hope to the World–JESUS CHRIST", and that is what we aim to do in our corner of this amazing state of Alaska.

We pray to follow our Lord's leading, to go and make disciples and to be salt and light in a dark place. The need is great, but our God is greater. "For I was hungry and you gave Me food; I was thirsty and you gave Me drink; I was a stranger and you took Me in; I was naked and you clothed Me; I was sick and you visited Me; I was in prison and you came to Me." Matthew 25: 35-36




