

Do Our Best to Say "Yes"

I really don't know all of the promises of God in the Bible by verse and chapter, but I do know this one that I call the umbrella promise. If I don't know the promise, God does and in Christ... it is yes.

Growing up I didn't hear "yes" a lot. I would ask for something and I was told "no," which seemed to be the baseline and the starting point. With this starting point, we would nag, negotiate, and harangue whoever was the authority with the negative response. If it was my dad, the negotiations were fairly short and over quickly. If it was a teacher, we just did our own thing and took the consequences as they came. If it was some other adult, we did our best not to get caught.

Funny thing is, when I grew up and started raising my own kids, the first response to their requests was no. It seemed the baseline hadn't changed and I really had to wrestle through this. So when my son asked me if he could drive to college with a friend from Alaska, he was a little surprised when I said yes since he was just 18 yrs. old. He continued to ask me several more times if I had really said yes. I think

he was almost disappointed we didn't go through the negotiation process.

I fear that this thinking has spilled over into our spiritual world. If more people knew that God in Christ was about saying yes to life, we might see some very different results. We even say that sometimes God says yes, sometimes no, and sometimes wait. But the text says that His promises are yes! And we need to do our best to say yes. It seems to me that God only says no when all the options for yes are untenable.

Therefore, as we head into the next four years, the conference wants to do its best to say yes. We have three major priorities:

- Discipleship
- Artic Mission Adventure (AMA)
- Youth/Young Adult Ministries

These three priorities are captured in the title and acronym A New DAY. When we receive requests that fit these priorities, we will do our best to say yes.

Requests could be for training in various areas related to these priorities. Churches can ask for help with resources they may not have or are not capable of getting on their own. They can ask for help with clarifying their own mission and vision while working in concert with the entire conference's vision. Getting spiritual counsel, guidance, and influence are more instances where help would be available. The conference will assist you with issues of accountability,

DISCIPLESHIP

With the increase in membership in the Alaska Conference through evangelism, we are stressing the importance of discipleship. We are committed to providing the tools the local church needs to implement discipleship programs. We also want to include increasing spirituality among pastors, teachers and lay leaders. The way this can be implemented is through pastors' and elders' meetings, as well as continuing education for the teachers, with two scheduled In-Service days for teachers and

two pastors' meetings to be scheduled in January and July each year. We will also provide elders' training annually and are looking at the possibility of having a deacons' training seminar.

board has been created to work together in making AMA successful. It is our hope to focus on three other areas of outreach: Dutch Harbor, Birch Creek and Ambler. Another goal of the Alaska Conference is to create an endowment of \$5 million as AMA is not a budgeted item and functions solely from donations. Our former president, Ken Crawford, was instrumental in getting people to donate to this project. Having an endowment of \$5 million would assure the work to continue in the conference.

YOUTH/YOUNG ADULT/EDUCATION

I remember looking at the membership list a few days ago. My eyes had gazed upon the number of members the Alaska Conference has enrolled in its records, and I began breaking it down into age groups. I was stunned with the results! This couldn't be true! How was it possible? Out of 3,846 members, only 222 were between the ages of 10 and 20. I was equally stunned when I realized that there were only 434 members between the ages of 20 and 30. How did this happen? In a young state where the median age is 32, we had failed to reach out to the greatest asset that we have.

We are determined in the upcoming years to make a focus on youth events such as summer camps, Pathfinders and youth prayer conferences. Thirty percent of the director's salary goes

to education and 70% goes to youth and young adults.

Remembering the membership list on my desk, an overwhelming conviction came over me. We need to keep our millennials in the church and have them become active in preparing people for the soon coming of Jesus.

Through the Lord's mercies we are not consumed, because his compassions fail not. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. The Lord is my portion, says my soul therefore I hope in him!

Money Follows Mission

One of the things that I appreciate most about Alaska and Alaskans is that a lot of things get done. People see something that needs doing and it gets taken care of. In many other locations people wait for instructions from a pastor or leader.

As an accountant I like to track numbers and use them for accountability. However, choosing what to measure to see whether progress is being made toward the right goal is sometimes a challenge. Obviously, you can drive yourself nuts analyzing every little aspect of everything you do.

Toddler Torture

In the late 60's and early 70's, researcher Walter Mischel began methodically tormenting four-year-olds at Stanford University's Bing Nursery School. More than 500 children were volunteered for the diabolical program by their own parents, many of whom would later, like millions of others, laugh mercilessly at videos of the squirming, miserable kids. The devilish experiment was called "The Marshmallow Test." It was an interesting way to look at willpower.

Kids were offered one of three treats-a pretzel, a cookie, or the now infamous marshmallow. The child was told that the researcher had to step away, and if he could wait 15 minutes until the researcher returned, he'd be awarded a second treat. One treat now or two later.

On average, kids held out less than three minutes. And only three out of ten managed to delay their gratification until the researcher returned. Starting in 1981, Mischel began systematically tracking down the original subjects. He requested transcripts, compiled records, and mailed questionnaires in an attempt to measure their relative academic and social progress. His hunch was correct-willpower or the ability to delay gratification was a huge indicator of future success. SAT test scores that were on average 210 points higher.

Success is about doing the right thing, not doing everything right. The trick is to choose the right habit and bring just enough discipline to establish it. That's all the discipline you need.

Olympic swimmer Michael Phelps is a case study of selected discipline. When he was diagnosed with ADHD as a child, his kindergarten teacher told his mother, "Your son will never be able to focus on anything."

Bob Bowman, his coach since age 11, reports that Michael spent a lot of time on the side of the pool by the lifeguard stand for disruptive behavior. That same misbehavior has cropped up from time to time in his adult life as well. Yet he has set dozens of world records.

Today, his mom reports, "Michael's ability to focus amazes me." Bowman calls it "his strongest attribute." How did this happen? How did the boy who would "never be able to focus on anything" achieve so much?

Phelps became a person of selected discipline. He channeled all of his energy into one discipline. The payoff from developing the right habit is pretty obvious. It gets you the success you're searching for. What sometimes gets overlooked, however, is an amazing windfall: it simplifies your life. Your life gets clearer and less complicated because you know what you have to do well.

The One Thing by Gary Keller & Jay Papasan

Your administrative team and Executive Committee is using the acronym DAY to describe the focus of this conference: Discipleship, Arctic Mission Adventure, and Youth/Young Adults.

Military leaders for thousands of years have learned that soldiers will fight more for comrades than for country, flag or ideals. Family ties in battle enable the mission to be accomplished as long as soldiers the right thing realize they are on a mission and not attending a family reunion.

Even today in Alaska we often have a far more romantic understanding of what shepherds do than who shepherds were in biblical times. Good shepherds led their sheep in order to obtain three things. They sheared the sheep, ate the sheep, or mated them for reproduction. In other words, sheep were expected to produce a profit.

I know that I am not the most disciplined or talented person. However I choose to let God use and focus what I give to him. I want to do that together with you.


