## Lord, Give Me A Vision

This church started with people who had a vision. Picture in your mind the preadvent believers as they entered a new town or village; their first inquiry was to find the most honest man in town. Then they would challenge him to be honest in his study of the Scripture and hear them out. As a result, often the whole town would turn out, for the byword on each lip, the greeting to every Christian was: Maranatha!!! The Lord is Coming!

During a camp meeting in the summer of 1843, a speaker stood up and began preaching on a subject unrelated to anyone. Before long, people stood up and called out, "We have no time for this! Is there anyone here that has a message from the Lord for us!?" Several people stood and proclaimed what the Lord had been showing them in His Word in preparation for the final hours; as a result, a fresh revival broke out right there. In the fall of 1844, estimates say that almost 300,000 people expected to meet their Divine Maker, then, after great disappointment, the adherents quickly slipped to 30,000 then to 3,000, and finally less than 30 people. By 1846, when the church was officially formed, there were 24 charter members with an average age of 23 years and that included the elderly Joseph Bates. From this humble beginning, these servants of the Most High moved the world, for they

had a vision. They bought land, started a health education institution, publishing houses and an education system. No sacrifice was too great for the cause was greater than themselves. It was God's work— a finished work. James and Ellen White sold every earthly possession including furniture and silverware, not once but twice, to further the work. All that we have today, including one of the finest health and education systems in the world, was a result of their vision.

Somehow, like the ten virgins when the bridegroom delayed his coming, it seems that the collective church has fallen into a Laodicean sleep. We have lost the sense of urgency of the finished work and we have lost our vision, our passion and the hope of a soon coming Christ.

We have became institutionalized, organized and our personal relationship with God has become formalized. As a result, we have become spiritually anemic and weak.

God has a vision for the future and what He wants to do with His church and God has a vision for the Alaska Conference. What do you think is God's vision for your church? Like Israel of old, He has placed you in a strategic location in one of the fastest growing states in the union.



Due to wise financial decisions that he made when he first became president, the conference weathered the economic roller coaster. Through fiscal discipline, sound decisions, and bearing down on expenses, the conference stands in an enviable financial position in comparison to other conferences around the North American Division. This is due to the Lord's blessing through Elder Crawford's leadership.

Elder Crawford was and is not content just to have the finances solid, because there is still a mission to do. He looked over the vast expanses of Alaska and saw all those people stretched across it in villages that have not yet heard the Three Angels' Message of Revelation 14. The constant question he challenges us with is, "how do we reach all those villages?" To that end, he revived the work where it once thrived but had languished. He recruited missionaries, raised funds, and restored infrastructure to the places that we once had a presence in. Today,

Savoonga, Gambell, Bethel, Togiak, Selawik, Shungnak, and Kodiak all have active ministry and mission happening. The conference is also beginning to raise funds, awareness, and plans to enter Dutch Harbor so that the Aleutian Chain can hear the good news entrusted to this church. Again, the Lord has used Elder Crawford to propel the mission forward in Alaska.

Perhaps the most important contribution that Elder Crawford has made is his passion for each member of the conference to have a real, personal, and continuing spiritual experience with Jesus. He has gone beyond words and preaching in this call to deepening our spiritual experience. He has mentored, encouraged, and shared his own

continual, growing spiritual experience. He instituted the elders training weekend and challenges the pastors to use the morning hours until at least 10:00 am for

#### **God Is Behind Bars Too**

She came in with anger spuing from her eyes. Her body language of crossed arms and slouched in her chair told a silent story of pain and grief. I thought to myself, why in the world did she come? This IS voluntary after all. The other four ladies who were in attendance came in with a smile and gentleness about them, and then there was her... the contrast was amazing.

Knowing what we were walking into and having been victims of our own battles, we knew the importance of prayer and started our Bible study time together asking the Holy Spirit to come into that place. The battle is real and we all know Ephesians 6:12 well. Immediately, the presence of the Holy Spirit was felt. Satan and his evil imps have no power over Jesus nor over anyone who calls on His name. Hallelujah!

We sang a couple of hymns and were ready to launch into our Bible study when our still angry visitor blurted out, "I have a question for you. I just want to know what "God" can do for a person who

is self- focused, messed up and \$%^&\* angry.... (silence) I'm \$%^&\* mad!!!" I immediately shot up a prayer asking God to give us wisdom, (thinking of James 1:5 that says, if we lack wisdom, you should ask God, who gives it generously to all.) A gentle inquiry was made if she knew anything about Jesus. She said she believed that there may be a God somewhere. She did believe in a devil, but had never ever read the Bible before. As we continued to talk and ask questions about basic Bible things, suddenly the realization of why we were there that day came clearly into my mind. See, all of us had been praying all week that God would bring whoever needed to be there to our weekly Bible study in the chapel of Highland Mountain Correctional Center in Eagle River. God works in such amazing ways and it was all coming together for me. I understood why, in the middle of church, the testimony I

planned on sharing didn't seem to be the right one and God impressed upon my heart to share something much different, something vulnerable and deep that I didn't readily want to share. I had been reluctant, but now I understood why the game changed.

Instead of the planned Bible study, we spent the next hour and half sharing personal testimonies on why we believe in God, testifying of how God has worked in our lives and changed us, and a mini Bible study on how evil got started in this world. It was so powerful. Every single lady there was touched, even our angry friend. Somewhere in the middle, the tears started flowing and the tough exterior started softening. The once rigid body language smoothed out and even her countenance was changing. It truly

was the most amazing thing I have ever seen. I liken it to watching a caterpillar come out of its cocoon.

As we finished up our forgiveness and surrender

could have been there. The peace felt in that room that day was like none other. Our angry friend looked peaceful and she felt peaceful too...something she hadn't experienced in a long time. Afterward, we visited and gave words of encouragement to these beautiful women seeking a God that many are just learning about. My thoughts wandered off to our God who must have been celebrating and the angel choir who were singing the victory song because a soul was won that day at the Highland Mountain Correctional Center. It gave me goose bumps to realize 1½ hours earlier the Holy Spirit encouraged a lonely, hurt, angry woman who didn't really believe in a God and who had never read the Bible in her life to come to Bible study; and who left with a different spirit about her and a countenance to show it. It reminds me of the quote, "God can do more in one moment to convict people

# ALASKA CONFERENCE 17TH REGULAR CONSTITUENCY SESSION

The 17th Regular Constituency Meeting of the Alaska Conference will be held in the main auditorium of the Pioneer Peak camp grounds in Palmer, Alaska on July 24, 2016. The meeting is held every four years as mandated by the Constitution & Bylaws of the Alaska Conference.

The purpose of the constituency session is to report on conference activities over the the last four years and to elect officers, directors and committee members as well as conduct planning for the next four years. This meeting is not open to all of the constituency, rather each church which hold membership in the local conference elects members to represent them at the session. From the delegate lists presented from membership churches, delegates are asked to serve on the organizing committee. The organizing committee in turn selects representatives to the nominating and constitution & bylaws committees. The nominating committee submits to the seated delegates in session a list of individuals to serve as conference officers, department directors and executive committee members.

The plan is to hold a Shark Attack Seminar this fall in the Anchorage-Palmer area. Stay posted at www. alaskaconference.org for sightings near you.






If God were to ask you to be a part of this last act of God's triumphant finish to this earth's history, what would He ask you to do???
