Project Polaris Chosen For 13th Sabbath Offering

Camp Polaris, locally known as Junior Camp, has been chosen to receive one-third of the 13th Sabbath Offering in the first quarter of 2015. We are excited and grateful for this blessing. Camp Polaris is located on Lake Aleknagik, near Dillingham, Alaska. It has been operating for 60+ years and was a mission project of the local people who were concerned for the youth in their area. It has blessed many lives and challenged youth to live for Jesus.

The buildings are the target of the 13th Sabbath Offering. A new bath house is in the plans, complete with a steam room for each side; a lodge and cabins are



also on the list and if the offering swells to great proportions, the camp will be able to service children better. We presently have no place for showers, no place to get warm and dry, and two of our older cabins were blown into the lake last winter. The current lodge has holes in the floor, holes in the roof, and birds come and go with the seasons to roost inside. The campers are sleeping on cardboard on old rusted frames, and while they don't complain, we feel that they would be more receptive to the Gospel if they could get a better night's sleep.

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Disruption, Incremental Change or Stability?


What would you think if you saw your company's business drop 65% in one year? This is exactly what has happened to the taxi business in San Francisco, California. Organizations called "ridesharing companies" have used the new technology of cell phone applications to allow individuals to go through limited training and then make themselves and their vehicles available by app to those needing rides for a fee or suggested donation also processed through the app. There seem to be three main competitors for the taxi business in San Francisco: Uber, Side-car, and Lyft. The disruption that has taken place in San Francisco is happening all over the country. Uber is now operating in Anchorage and over 200 other cities. The app is rather interesting in that it will show that your request for a ride has been accepted and then a map showing where the car is as it moves toward you. Many of the riders say that the new service is less expensive, quicker and user friendly.

I have a friend who used to attend church with me. He has not been to church in many years, but claims that he can tell you exactly everything that will occur in his former church in the same order that it always has occurred. He also claims he can tell you who will be sitting in which row.

A former pastor of the Forest Lake Church in Florida talks about the needs of a Bible study class of retired adults. He says that the first few years of retirement are an exciting and relaxing time for most of them. But as time goes on, more medical and other problems arise. Often times the body no longer does what it used to or at least not at the same speed. The retirees feel like they are losing control. They end up moving to be near children or into assisted living and they love being able to come to church and see familiar faces. It gives great comfort to be able to repeat Bible stories and lessons that have not changed in thousands of years.

Change is coming, ready or not. Recently one of my high school teachers passed away. He became an Adventist by listening to the radio. Greater Works!

In March of this year, I attended the North Pacific Union's biennial Prison Ministry conference in Gladstone, Oregon. I had been invited to teach a seminar on utilizing correspondence Bible studies with inmates who attend our services. In the last two years, laborers in Alaska have enrolled over 1,000 students into Discover

Bible School courses in the institutions. Each week we continue to enroll 10 to 15 new students. In a typical week, over 100 lessons are reviewed and processed to those who continue with the lesson studies.

As a result, relationships are built

with these serious disciples, which in turn leads to an ever growing number of private visits. And once that relationship deepens, we come to understand that we

fear, and desperately desire to avoid the likelihood that they will return to their former life. And they will if there is not a "shelter in a time of storm."



Approaching the Greater Works Center

Think about it! In the institutions they have church, shelter, food, clothing, social contact, and institutional work opportunities. When they get out what do we offer them? Church! But too often before they take advantage of the fellowship with us, they have already been immersed in their former unhealthy environment which contributed to their original fall. Now there are certainly those who follow through with their conviction to avoid the past snares. One such disciple was released last November and his desire to avoid all of his prior associations was so strong that he spent all winter living in his car. Can you imagine how we, on the one hand, were full of awe at the depth of his devotion to his new faith, but on the other hand, were full of despair as we came to realize that we had fallen short of what God has put on our hearts?

So when I attended the conference, my main goal was to attend any seminars that pertained to transitional living programs. God led mightily and swiftly. This month (September) we formed Greater Works Christian Living Center in a 4,700 square foot house here in Anchorage. Two weeks later, we accepted our first resident. Our projections are (based on those disciples who are getting out) that we will be full by November.

On August 16th, I was given the opportunity to preach at the Hillside O'Malley Church. It was a Prison Ministry Sabbath. Two disciples who now attend our church joined me on the platform. It was a moving time as we witnessed the testimony of two formerly hardened souls who have totally given their lives over to the God of love. Both of these fellows now go into the halfway houses sharing weekly what God's power can mean for a submitted child of His. Understandably, an appeal for financial support was made. The response from the Hillside members has been overwhelming, not only financially, but also in furnishing and equipping the Center.

And the word is spreading throughout the Adventist community. Eagle River church members have been responsive, and last Sabbath when I preached at the Talkeetna Church, before church even started, a member came up and handed me a folded up piece of paper saying it

Golden Heart Christian School:


Diana Knapp has taken over teaching duties at Golden Heart teaming up with her daughter Melinda Ranville who has assisted at GHCS for several years.

Life In Savoonga

I love the cool crisp mornings of the spring and fall, the mild mornings (40° F) of summer in this arctic village. I love walking along the shoreline by the graveyard or listening to the ocean as

the waves rumble and crash. I love the simple life and the unity within the village. I enjoy trudging along in the snow as the sun glistens like diamonds across the unmarked snow.

Most of all, I love the PEOPLE. Everyone helps each other; they take care of each other and they help

take care of us. Daily life in Savoonga can be difficult so you always plan ahead. Winter brings special challenges with

blizzard days when you can't go outside because of the STRONG winds and "whiteouts." One time, my husband attempted to go the ten feet from the house door to the door of the church,

but the wind blew him down. I tied a rope to something in the entry way and threw it to him so he could get back into the house!

Savoonga has an air strip, post office, store and a beautiful new school. The

school staff come from the Lower 48, but they only stay one-two years. Some teachers see it as their mission and stay longer; two have been here 12 years.

Daily life is about survival; you must plan ahead for

not just tomorrow, but for next month by making sure you do not run out of supplies/resources. Savoonga has just one store that is outrageously expensive, but going to the store is where I always see friends.

On a typical day, we may get a phone call early in the morning to come to someone's house because there is a crisis. That usually means a suicide or suicide attempt. I receive many calls like this because I am a registered nurse. I never go to bed at night without having appropriate clothing laid out to put on quickly.

I receive phone calls every day from someone wanting special prayer. Most here believe in God, but many also believe in spirits and dreams. Several times we've prayed to get rid of "evil spirits." I spend time in the church every day, reading, studying, and preparing for the next thingwhether it is Sabbath School, organizing the cabinets, etc. Kids LOVE to come by after school and help me with whatever I am doing. I pray that years from now, those kids will have good memories of things in the Seventh-day Adventist (SDA) church; that they remember that each one is a child of God and that He loves them, no matter what they could ever do.

Food preparation takes planning. Do I make bread today? Do I cook beans today or is there enough left from yesterday? Do I mix milk today? There is always someone coming by for a meal in our house or asking for food to take home and prepare for their family. I rarely say no to anyone for I feel that you cannot feed the soul until you feed the stomach. Because we represent the church, we frequently have people ask for food and/or clothing items. I give to them out of our personal food supply because our friends and family members often send boxes of food for us to give away. There are always kids coming by at supper time. I know they will come so I plan for it by cooking more than we need for ourselves.

I try to attend as many village functions as possible and I do these things to be a part of the community. I like to attend the high school basketball games with my husband. Sometimes we go to the

And let them make me a sanctuary; that I may dwell among them.

To be fair and honest, there has been a church in Shungnak since the late 60's, but like many other villages in Alaska where we had a mission post, many of our facilities had been abandoned and have become run down. My wife Airen and I have been in Shungnak for four years now and have been longing for our old church to have life breathed back into it again. Much like how King Jehoash and Jehoiada the priest set it upon their hearts to "repair the breaches" in the sanctuary, so Airen and I, with the great support and encouragement of our conference, have taken it upon ourselves to repair the Shungnak Church.

We started the process of reinforcing the insulative properties of the church in July 2014 with the help of the Helmuth family from Spokane, Washington, which was a great blessing. We completed nearly all the walls and even were able to apply stucco as well, but still have a bit left to finish. Chet Miller and his wife, Benateta, came to help us in early September and will be finishing up the roof by the time they leave. We also have the Parker family coming to help us during the winter this year and will be joining us in November. With their help, we hope to finish with the underside of the church as

well as the many cosmetic upgrades to the interior that we hope to accomplish. We also had Stan Musgrove build the steps of the church and installed the new windows and door.

There is still much left to do, but God

has put it on us and we praise Him for also encouraging our brothers and sisters far and near who have joined themselves to the cause of Shungnak. We want to personally thank each and every one of you who has prayed, helped, and sacrificed time or

money to the Shungnak Church. You have helped encourage us and given us hope. We are confident that this church will become an active center for the worship of

our Creator. Thank you and God bless you.




Moses stand up for his faith in God, they explored how they can do the same by trusting God in everyday life.

gym during "open gym". A lot of adults go there and play basketball or volleyball for the exercise and fellowship.

Frequently, young ladies come to talk with me, mostly just to have a neutral person to listen to them. Sometimes, they come to the house or catch up to me on my walks simply to talk. At times it would be about spousal abuse. Often, it was about having to give their newborn baby away. It breaks the mother's heart and they cry and mourn almost as if the baby had died. Their cultural practice of giving their baby away to an older person in the village is not adhered to as much as it used to be.

I have been called on many occasions to come help out in the clinic when it is very busy, after normal business hours. One particular frigid, blizzardy night around 6 p.m., a man accidently shot himself while putting away his gun and blew his left arm almost off at the ball/ socket joint at the shoulder. There were two other emergency situations going on at the same time so I was asked to come help. I did patient assessments, put in IV's, etc. Medevac was coming from Nome to pick up the patient, but due to weather, they could not land. I prayed: Dear God, it is in Your hands. This patient was in VERY CRITICAL condition. As an Intensive

Care Unit nurse, I knew if we did not do something quickly, he would die right in front of us. So, in communication with Emergency Medical Services in Nome, we put in a chest tube. The health aide was young in age and experience, but did a wonderful job helping take care of

this patient. We finished the chest tube just before the Medevac arrived two hours later from their initial attempt to

land. This man is doing well today with one arm and I did only what I would always have done, but to his family it was exceptional. They continued to thank me for a long time afterwards. Their appreciation made me feel GREAT!

Even though life can be a challenge, I love

Savoonga. I love the simple life. I love the people. I wish I was younger so I could give my whole life to work in the arctic.

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Alaska Camps: Guarding Lives For Another Season

Mission Lifeguard was the theme for Alaska Camps this 2014 summer season. As the camp staff moved from Camp Tukuskoya near Big Lake, to Camp Polaris near Dillingham and then on to the Palmer Campmeeting grounds and finally Camp Lorraine near Wrangell, Alaska, they carried their mission to 163 campers, numerous adults and curious onlookers.

Mission Lifeguard is based on a book by the same name and authored by Steve Case. Our chaplain and pastor James Ellison the Great, inspired us to look at ourselves as lifeguards, alive at this moment, to rescue those around us that could be spiritually drowning.

We were blessed with the baptism of three youth at Camp Tukuskoya, performed in true airplane runway style, by Aaron Payne. All but three of the 163 campers responded positively to the call to follow Jesus.

The camp staff faced some real challenges at Camp Polaris when they had to team together and get two staff and a camper off the mountain who had challenging medical conditions. They worked together and did what they were told even in exhausting times. They

learned that as lifeguards, sometimes, "The life you save could be your own."

The prayer I remember the most was offered by a small camper. "Dear God, thank you for sending these people to tell us about Jesus."

was a donation for the Center. I put it in my case. As I was driving back to Anchorage to conduct a service at the jail, I thought I'd open it. I had to control the wheel as my eyes saw the figure of \$1,000. Oh, the time of praise was wonderful as I made calls to other laborers to share the news with them! We thank all who have, through God's leading, become co-laborers with us.

We would welcome the opportunity to bring a Prison Ministry Sabbath to your church. One elderly member at Hillside came up to me after and said, "This was the best Sabbath I have ever attended!" Folks, she has to be 80 years old! We know that what is occurring is nothing short of miraculous and is consistent with our Lord's commandment in Matthew 28:18-20.

In Acts 19, we find Paul, who has come to Corinth, and finding 12 weak disciples, explains the way of the Lord concerning the Holy Spirit and re-baptizes them. In verse 8, we see Paul teaching in the synagogue, but when the multitude turns against the believers, Paul takes a critical step (verse 9), "He departed from them and withdrew the disciples..." And in verse 10 we see how God used that: "And this continued for two years, so that all who dwelt in Asia, heard the word of the Lord Jesus..." 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Help Us Say YES! To Youth In Alaska

On January 7, 2011, the Alaska Executive committee set up a new financial track for funding our priorities of the next five years. Their vote was to designate funds for the following: Youth/young adult ministry in Alaska, Evangelism for children, Pathfinders and youth camps, and Schools in Alaska: Christian education programming that will enhance the spiritual growth of students in Alaska, thereby creating the YES fund.

This new giving track was designed to replace the old track of "Conference Advance" and was specifically designed to focus on our youth and education. These funds flow through the conference, but are not a part of our regular budget and therefore considered a "special offering." The conference does not use these funds. They are restricted for these specific areas in the following percentages: Youth/young adult programming: 53%, Evangelism for children, Pathfinders and youth camps: 17% and Schools in Alaska: 30%. In 2013, youth/young adults ministry received \$27,000, six schools received \$15,000 and youth camps received \$8,500.

Our Current Challenge

We currently have our two largest growing schools (Palmer and Anchorage) that have stepped out in faith and hired an extra teacher without a funding source from the conference as we do not have funds in the budget. The cost for the conference portion of the subsidy would be an additional \$68,000. The Executive Committee has requested that any available **YES** funds for 2014 over our designated budget help fund these two additional positions.

We would like to appeal to the sisterhood of churches to help fund these growing schools.
