I sat in the empty dome car enjoying solitude while the train raced through the night carrying its load of sleeping passengers. Like a sigh, the human psyche craves moments of solitude and I was enjoying this one. I was returning from my first Christmas at home since I left for college and the day had been filled with harried parents trying to entertain restless children, talkative seatmates and busy conductors. Now it was nice to sit in the darkness and watch the lights of the countryside flash by, interspersed by the bright lights of sleeping towns. I was an emerging adult enjoying the freedom of my own decisions, yet at the same time full of questions and doubts about my ability to live life the way I dreamed. My life was a dichotomy of blended optimism and fear.

Then he slipped into the seat beside me with the usual inane question, “May I join you?” I silently responded, *No! You may not! I am here to get away from people like you! Leave me alone!* But I was courteous, so we sat in silence watching the lights flash by.

I stole a sidelong glance at this man beside me. I judged him to be in his mid-sixties, well dressed with striking silver hair that flowed over his collar.

He began to speak into the darkness in a gentle voice. “So tell me about yourself. If you were to describe yourself what would you say?” An odd way to start a conversation, but I tried to paint a picture of who I was. He listened with interest then continued the questions.

“What do you like most about yourself?” What do you envision yourself like when you are my age?” Have you ever had tragedy in your life?” What goals do you have that would cause you to risk everything?” What kind of a mate would you look for?” What do you believe about God?”

The questions came so smoothly I was not only disarmed, but challenged to explore my own thinking and my direction in life. This man, with deep insight into human nature, led me on a path of self-examination that was nothing short of amazing and he did it in such a gentle kind way.

On through the darkness we traveled, unaware of time, caught up in a world of questions that challenged my views of life. As the pink hues of dawn tainted the sky, I realized that we had talked through the entire night and it had seemed like a moment. Never in that time had he revealed anything about himself, yet with

We do, however, have one gift that our heavenly Father appreciates even more deeply than we can possibly understand. That gift of ours that we can give Him is our heart.

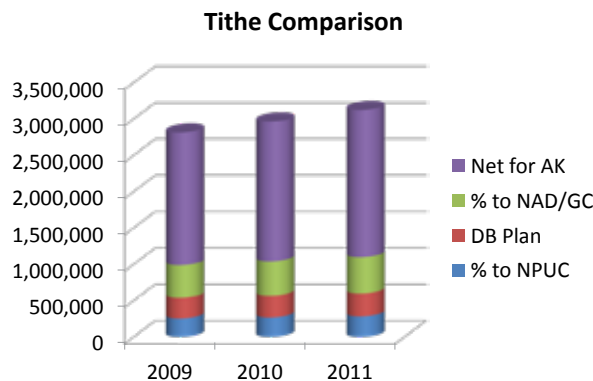

churches. Nine percent of the tithe is allocated for the work of the North Pacific Union Conference. Sixteen percent is allocated for the work of the North American Division and General Conference. Ten percent is used to help fund the defined benefit retirement plan for retired employees of our church in North America. The remaining 65 percent (\$2,026,654 through October, 2011) is used for God's ministry here in Alaska.

Tithe is the primary source of income for God's work in the Alaska Conference. And what blessings we ourselves receive in returning tithe to our Lord. The tithe is a continual reminder to us as individuals that everything we have and everything we are belongs to Him.

# FCC Opens The Way For Mid-Power Class D FM Stations

The Alaska Conference leadership has a burden to reach Alaska through Media Ministries in both TV and Radio format.

Pastor Dan Jackson, President of the Seventh-day Adventists Church in North America reminded the conference presidents that, “We need to move ahead with boldness and with urgency, we need to utilize all our energies, creativity and resources to fulfill God’s expectation to His end of time leadership”. The Adventist membership in Alaska is less than 1% of the current population; it will be a bold challenge to lay out a statewide evangelism initiative with present resources.

Recently, Federal Communication Commission (FCC) Attorney Don Martin opened to the Alaska Conference the possibility of filing for a number of mid-range FM Class D stations (about 10KW) that would meet power issues and federal licensing requirements. The Class D station must be owned by a nonprofit corporation and must broadcast only noncommercial programming. These stations are less regulated than full power stations -- but they still must comply with certain basic requirements, including the Emergency Alert System. A Class D station can originate its own programming, or it can take programming from a network source and there is no minimum studio or staffing requirement like there is for full power stations. There is no minimum requirement for local programming although the station

must be on the air a minimum of 36 hours per week, including at least 5 hours per day during 6 days of the week.

Uniquely in Alaska, applications for Class D stations can be filed at any time. Upon review, the FCC will issue a public notice of the application. That notice triggers the beginning of a 30-day period for public comment, petitions and competing applications. The threat from competing applications is not significant because of the availability of other frequencies in most places.

From filing the application to grant, the process is likely to take up to six months. Most Class D stations would have a strong clear signal for most mid-size towns and cities in Alaska, and could be installed for somewhere in the range of \$20,000 to \$30,000. There are significant variables that depend entirely on the local conditions at the site and local participation in project development will be essential for completion.

The localities that have more than 5,000 population will be an initial priority for installation.

## Wee Blessings

The small town of Ketchikan, Alaska is known as the “The Fishing Capital of the World,” but it is also known for *Wee Blessings*.

*Wee Blessings*, located on the lower floor of the Ketchikan Adventist Church, offers free clothing, shoes, household goods, and food. All items are acquired through donations from the community and, because of the church’s central location in Ketchikan, many patrons come from the outer islands such as Prince of Wales and Metlakatla.

*Wee Blessings* has been serving the community for 10 years in conjunction with *Love, Inc.* and is the only center in town where all items are free. It is set up like a department store with newborn to adult sized clothing. The center is currently run by church volunteers Bonnie and Embert James with Mary and Harold

Helfrich, but many others help for it takes a lot of volunteers to sort and arrange clothing items. The store is open to the community on Sundays from noon to 4:00 pm and serves an average of 75 patrons daily. A section of *Wee Blessings* offers Christian literature and patrons can leave prayer requests or request Bible studies if they choose.

Patrons love it and volunteers often say what a blessing it is for them to be there and serve those in need.

## Church Level Satellite TV Development

While Jesus was discussing the signs in Matthew 24 about the coming end of the world, He provided the disciples with two principles for their future approach to the coming times. The first principle was “fear not” and the second was “occupy till I come”. These two ideas intersect and are relevant to the Alaska Conference as we plan for the future.

The fast changing world of technology has outpaced the traditional modes of evangelism and outreach and the reality is that now churches have the ability to be the center of informational, educational and spiritual connection through the media.

Our goal is to develop “Media Ministries” by installing a powerful satellite receiver and Digital Video Recorder under the 3ABN broadcasting network using the Glorystar Christian

Satellite to all Adventist churches in Alaska. This initiative will allow remote churches to watch and listen to real time services and programming that will improve spiritual connectedness and unity of worship. This development will also enable churches to view the coming *Reach Alaska Net 2012* on June 8-16, 2012, in real time.

Areas considered as priority for installations are Arctic hub cities and other cities with more than a 5,000 population such as Bethel, Barrow, Kotzebue, Nome, Valdez, Craig, Ketchikan, Cordova and Sitka.

“Being connected with the worldwide body of fellowship adds a color to the Adventist way of life and encourages mission involvement in a more sustainable way”.

## God's Little Steward

A sobbing little girl stood near a small church from which she had been turned away because it "was too crowded."

"I can't go to Sunday School," she sobbed to the pastor as he walked by seeing her shabby, unkempt appearance. The pastor guessed the reason and, taking her by the hand, took her inside and found a place for her in the Sunday School class. The child was so touched that she went to bed that night thinking of the children who have no place to worship Jesus

Some two years later, this child lay dead in one of the poor tenement buildings and the parents called for the kind-hearted pastor who had befriended their daughter to handle the final arrangements. As her poor little body was being moved, a worn and crumpled purse was found which seemed to have been rummaged from some trash dump. Inside was found 57cents and a note scribbled in childish handwriting which read, "This is to help build the little church get bigger so more children can go to Sunday School.

For two years she had saved for this offering of love. When the pastor tearfully read that note, he knew instantly what he would do. Carrying this note and the cracked, red pocketbook to the pulpit, he told the story of her unselfish love and devotion. He challenged his deacons to get busy and raise enough money for the larger building.

But the story does not end there! A newspaper learned of the story and published it. It was read by a realtor who offered them a parcel of land worth many thousands. When told that the church could not pay so much, he offered it for 57 cents. Church members made large donations. Checks came from far and wide. Within five years the little girl's gift had increased to \$250,000.00--a huge sum for that time (near the turn of the twentieth century).

Her unselfish love had paid large dividends. In the city of Philadelphia stands the Temple Baptist Church with a seating capacity of 3,300. On the same grounds is the Temple University, where hundreds of students are trained, along with the Good Samaritan Hospital and a Sunday School building which houses hundreds of Sunday School children. No child in the area will ever need to be left outside during Sunday School time.

In one of the rooms of this building may be seen the picture of the sweet face of the little girl whose 57 cents, so sacrificially saved, made such remarkable history. Alongside of it is a portrait of her kind pastor, Dr. Russell H. Conwell, author of the book, "Acres of Diamonds".

God is indeed faithful to not only supply all your needs, but to supply your gifts to Him for His dwelling place.
