

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



A WORD FROM THE DIRECTOR

Twenty-twenty started out not too different from 2019. Arctic camp meeting in Nome was invigorating and Bristol Bay Camp Meeting was equally energizing. But as our flight left Dillingham, Alaska, it was apparent that our world was about to change. Overnight, ministry as we knew it halted. Connections that we once enjoyed, and maybe even took for granted, ceased. Fear and anxiety of the unknown gripped the hearts of many villagers and service people alike.



Our AMA workers were able to pivot to online or phone prayer lines, VHF and radio church services which, in some villages, grew to a new outreach. During these dark days of discouragement and frustration, as people tuned in to hear about the hope in Jesus, hearts were convicted and several people accepted Christ and were baptized.

One very important and powerful lesson COVID-19 lockdowns taught is that what matters is not buildings, but people. When faced with the question, "What will you do when you are told not to worship?" God's leaders, inspired by the Holy Spirit, faced obstacles and found effective ways to keep the Gospel Mission alive.

ARCTIC MISSION ADVENTURE MINISTRY

WHO WE ARE

AMA is an outreach ministry of the Alaska Conference of SDA. Currently, nine AMA pastors and/or workers live in Alaska Native Bush communities, with the goal of integrating into village life and building relationships through ministries that meet the needs of both old and young. AMA workers use the parsonage in each village for spiritual, emotional, mental and physical healing. Their sole priority is to present Jesus through transformative evangelism. They feed the hungry, clothe the needy, provide day camps and Vacation Bible Schools (VBS) for children and pray for those in need. The potential to reach, especially the young, is great considering approximately 34% of most village communities are between the ages of 1-19 years old.

Over the years, there has been significant growth with AMA and we praise God for this; yet in many ways, we have just begun. There are still over 200 villages with no AMA presence! We continue to move forward in faith as we bear witness to the positive difference in the lives of the people that we serve and the community response that the program has received. Please lift up AMA in your prayers asking God's continued blessing on this ministry.

WHAT WE DO

We have recently restructured our work in villages to reflect a "Center of Influence" model. AMA work and support within villages/hubs encompasses six elements: aviation, radio, camps, outreach, mission trips and Adopt-a-Village. Our vision is to develop centers of influence in each of the nine Alaska Native hubs that would include hub-to-village support; a radio station; dedicated AMA workers with a parsonage; day camps, food and clothing banks; and sound spiritual and financial support from churches, schools, and individuals adopting the hub and supported villages.

The next few pages are full of many exciting examples of how God is moving through Alaska and touching many through our AMA workers within their center of influence.

DUTCH HARBOR

Since the time Dutch Harbor was establish as a fishing village many decades ago until now, there has been little to no SDA believer/s here except for me. The island has an average population of 3,500 and they need to know or at least hear about Jesus from a SDA perspective. Unfortunately, most establishments, houses and even public buildings are in lockdown due to COVID-19 and I have been restricted in reaching out to the community. But God works through a pandemic, connecting me with four residents for Bible studies. The group has been meeting regularly and it is so exciting to see the Gospel moving in people's hearts. GAMBELL

Our village is very reliant on subsistence living. We hunt and depend on the bounty of the Bering Sea resources. Because we are such a small community (roughly 700 people), we depend on each other when food resources run low. One of the biggest food opportunities is when the village is able to harvest a whale. The whole village comes out to help haul it in and harvest the meat to be distributed to all. This year the village had not harvested a whale and food was very much needed. We got a call that a whale was harvested in Utqiagvik and they asked if we could use whale skin and meat. I was given the opportunity to share this important food to over 500 people including elders and to all the boat crews out there and it was all given from the SDA church.

UTQIAGVIK

Due to the lockdown, our ministry this year has been mainly to the members of the church. We had planned outreach and Pathfinder activities, however we had to modify them to either be virtual or a display instead of the in-person activities that we wanted to do. For example, our Pathfinder club has been meeting on Zoom to do honors and we had a virtual investiture service. We had planned to do what is called a "Blue Christmas," which is a time when the community can come together to mourn the loss of loved ones at Christmas time. Because of the lockdown, we opted instead to decorate the windows of the church with a beautiful verse from Isaiah and lights so that anyone who drove or walked by the church would see them lit up in the dark and read the Christmas message. This way the community would still receive something, even if it was only a nice thought, over Christmastime.

TOGIAK

Our parsonage provides a "safe" place for many young people to come when they are in trouble. They can get a meal, shower, do laundry, hang out and stay when needed. Three times this last year, we did suicide watches here until the young person was able to go to the hospital the next day for help. When a young person comes to us, it is often in a hurry. They are often in need of a shower and they don't have the items needed with them. Providing them with toiletries, towels, and something to wear while we wash their own clothes is so appreciated. Often, they choose to take the clothes they are given to wear. We take for granted having a bathtub or shower in our homes. A lot of the village homes do not have that luxury, but thankfully most have running water and sewer now. The villagers use outdoor saunas for bathing but not all the young people get the opportunity to use one. We find meeting basic needs is a huge part of our ministry.

While visiting the village, a person asked a young teen what church she attended. I heard her answer, "I go to the Seventh-day church every Monday. They have a special church for teens." She was referring to our teen nights where youth come, eat a meal together, have worship and play games. They also find opportunities to learn about leadership, teamwork and that Jesus is their best friend. God is blessing our teens. We have seen young people grow in Christ and even attend our educational institutions.


Kotzebue members tell me that they look forward to prayer meeting every week because it's a time in which they are able to decompress and refocus back on Jesus from their weekly struggles.

SELAWIK

Every Wednesday and Saturday we preach and get anywhere between five to seven homes that respond with positive feedback such as, "Thank you", "God bless you" and "Thanks uma" (friend). Even the pastor from the Friends Church goes on VHF and says, "Praise the Lord for the message."

NOME

In spite of 2020 being a COVID-19 year, God has kept us busy doing His work. From prayer meeting to church service to young adult night and Bible studies, we have been able to connect and uplift many people who are yearning to connect with their Savior, Jesus, during these uncertain times.

One of our favorite ministries is going to Seaside, a halfway house in Nome. This ministry has allowed us to connect with many people in our region that are transitioning back into society. Many would gather in a room in the facility to sing songs and hear me tell of the love of Jesus through the Word. Some have maintained a connection with us after they have fulfilled their time and transitioned back into society.

God has led me to witness across the radio waves in two ways: one is by holding Bible studies on our Adventist radio station in Nome every Friday. We have received reports from listeners that they really look forward to those Bible studies and that the studies have been a blessing. The other radio opportunity has come through the village commercial radio station KICY. Every month, I was allotted a half an hour to preach the Gospel to those all over the Norton Sound. This has been an incredible ministry and beacon of hope during dark times of COVID-19.


DILLINGHAM


