SHARING IS CARING PRACTICAL PERSONAL MINISTRY



Evangelistic methods have always included public and private evangelism. Jesus was a master at both. Today, public evangelism includes familiar events such as evangelistic meetings, and media campaigns. However, we are told that many souls can be won to Christ through our personal efforts that could not be reached through preaching and evangelistic campaigns alone. Then what should we be doing to have a successful personal ministry?

There's no better example of an effective ministry than that of Jesus Christ. In Matthew 4, Christ spent more time healing than preaching. He was observant, intentional, and personable. He spent His precious time listening and addressing the needs of the people He met on an individual level. Jesus led with what we now call "friendship evangelism". Relationship is essential



at every stage of evangelism, but our duty is not fulfilled by just being friendly. When sowing the seeds of truth, while studying the Bible together, at baptism, and beyond, relationship is essential to continue growth into spiritual maturity. Eventually we must prayerfully invite our friends to follow Him (MH p.143). Sharing eternal life with our friends is the best way to care for them!



As we prepare for the evangelistic series in 2024, let's follow Christ's example and think about what we can do personally to build "seed planting" relationships with our families, coworkers, neighbors, friends. Anchorage Northside and Community Church members participated in a personal ministry training session where we talked about simple things such as going door-todoor sharing baked goods and GLOW tracts with neighbors during the holidays, participating in community service projects, and Bible studies. After a couple hours of sledding down sand dunes with my family at White Sands National Park, my daughter enthusiastically announced, "There's a camel in the desert". As she took off running, I was pretty sure that we wouldn't be finding a wild camel in New Mexico but I didn't want to lose my daughter in the desert, so I ran too. Earlier, while working on a Junior Ranger scavenger hunt, my kids claimed to see all kinds of desert animals that I didn't see. But there was a different level of conviction with this camel spotting. We ran up sand dunes and slid down the other side. Then she would beg me to climb up the next, just sure that we could catch a glimpse of the camel from there.

I was enjoying her enthusiasm and the run in the sand but I was not really looking for a camel. Until we found it! There was a camel being led by a man with a sun hat and a long white beard! Seeing it from a distance wasn't good enough for my daughter. After all, we had journeyed across the desert to find that camel. As we approached, I felt like

our interest in seeing the camel might be an inconvenience to the owner, but he welcomed us. We visted and he let us pet his camel. He used our phone to take pictures and I learned that he brought his camel to the park every Sunday with the very intention of visiting with people. Before we left he said, "I need to pay you for stopping to see my camel". Several people gathered around the camel and he made sure to pay all of us as he handed out fake \$1 million bills. Printed on the bill was the million question: "Do you know Jesus as your personal Savior?". The guestion was followed by several Bible verses outlining the basics of the Gospel message. Some people simply thanked him and walked away. Some looked confused. Everyone took it and I listened as a few of those camel visitors engaged in spiritual conversations.

My daughter was right. There was a camel in the desert. But what we found was something I expected even less and that was an evangelistic camel in that desert.



Camel evangelism reminds us that evangelism is a creative work. The mission God has given us is clear that we are called to make disciples (Matthew 28:19-20). The mission never changes, but the methods can. Jesus was a creative evangelist. He did parable evangelism, miracle evangelism, and conversations at-the-well evangelism. He was resourceful. He was an opportunist. He was creative!

Our conference leaders are guiding us in some exciting evangelistic plans and I am pleased that, along with the organizational structure provided, they are also leading us in conversations about creative evangelism.

The importance of our mission should motivate us to get creative. A few creative minds can be a great benefit, but our impact will be strengthened when each of us prayerfully explores the creative ways the Holy Spirit is inviting us to reach our communities. You have a unique perspective. Share your creative evangelism ideas with your church leadership and refine the ideas in prayer. When you are tempted to dismiss a method because it is too different, remember that God uses camels in the desert.





WRANGELL HEALTH FAIR

As the plane slowly descended towards the expansive tundra, 17 students were anticipating where their home for the next ten days would be. As a few shining roofs, surrounded by ice and snow, began to emerge in the sun's setting rays, the students were unsure of their ability to handle the frigid temperatures of the subarctic north. Thus began our mission trip to Bethel Alaska.

For months, Thunderbird Adventist Academy students had been preparing for this moment. Meeting after meeting, students asked questions about how they could survive in such a place such as Bethel. With the ebbing of time, students replaced that fear with expectancy and a conqueror's attitude. As the wheels touched the ground, the reality of all our planning came into sharp focus.

Bethel SDA Church welcomed us with open arms and though our dwelling was small, it was warm and ably housed us for the next week. Students hit the ground running; checking out the local digs (the local AC, Brown's Slough, snow and ice, etc.) as they settled into their new home. We spent Sabbath worshiping with the local church where our students put on the program and Julliette and Rebecca shared the Word with us. It was a blessing to us and the community.

Sunday started off early and we encountered our first obstacle of the trip. Our contact at the homeless shelter (Bethel Winter House) became ill and was unavailable. We kept looking to make sure we weren't in the wrong place and eventually gave up. Going back to the church a little discouraged that we had missed something important, we retooled and started to prepare for our Vacation Bible School (VBS) program that was starting that evening. The rest of the day was spent in preparation for that and when we finally connected with

the Winter House, all was explained and we developed another plan to begin our work at the homeless shelter on Monday.

The week went by quickly with morning work at the Bethel Winter House and VBS in the afternoons. Students cooked for the homeless community, deep cleaned the facilities, and organized many things that had been overlooked due to being short staffed. The VBS program brought us 22 young children eager to learn about The Creation Story. For seven days, Thunderbird students shared the message of God our Creator. This involved songs, skits, activities, and snacks all to show how awesome The Creation Story is. The culmination of the week was on Sabbath demonstrating how a loving Creator set a special day aside to spend time with us.

All good things must come to an end and Sabbath saw us heading back to the airport in the evening. We said our goodbyes to the children that we had bonded with over the week and wished everyone well. Soon the tundra was fading into the distance as night fell on Bethel, but the memories and experiences were forever etched into our minds. Our mission complete, 17 students started making their way back to the deserts of Arizona forever changed.









SHUNGNAK A VILLAGE IN NEED

During my short time in the village of Shungnak, I witnessed things that left my heart bleeding for the people there. A village of roughly 275 people, many are unemployed and have few social activities. The predominant church in the village is the Friends Church though only a handful of people regularly attend. Most spend their days at home, while the children wander the villages. Unfortunately, like other villages in Alaska, many of these kids have experienced some form of neglect or abuse.

When my wife Maddie and I arrived, our first priority was to provide a place for kids to find safety and care. Every week we opened our home for them to play board games, eat Maddie's fresh baked cookies, and drink hot chocolate together which brought a dozen or so children weekly. In fact, from this simple act, most of the attendance for church consisted of almost entirely these kids! Whenever I would run into them, they would ask if we were doing

the activities again that week. Because we were only in the village for the fall months, they were heartbroken when we had to leave. There is a definite need for care and attention of youth to help stop the cycle of anger and abuse some encounter. Adults in the village are kind and welcoming, but many struggle with substance abuse. There is such a great need and opportunity for mental, physical and spiritual healing in the Shungnak!

During my time there, I spoke with "David", chief of psychological help in the local clinic who requested permission to use the church building for an Alcoholic Anonymous meeting for the village. All that's left is to find people willing to ask for help. The prayers of others will be instrumental in moving people to make the decision to seek help.

There is an Adventist Christian radio station in the village with the ability to provide a wonderful ministry to the people, but sadly, due to bad internet connection, it has not been operational.



People ask for it to be fixed as they miss the uplifting music. Hope in Shungnak is in short supply and it is evident that our station has been a benefit to village. My prayer is that it is soon repaired and returned to the people of Shungnak.

Although our time was limited, we see that a bi-vocational pastor would be the best fit for Shungnak. One that can work side by side with the people, while sharing God's word. Only He can give true hope and peace.

The Harrisons have accepted a call to the Oregon Conference effective June 2023.

YOUR TITHES AND OFFERINGS AT WORK

JIM JENSEN, Vice President-Finance, Alaska Conference

When I drop my tithe envelope into the plate, where does it go? Any local conference or church offerings stay local, whereas tithe begins a carefully thought out, but complex journey. First, your local church treasurer sends all tithe funds to the local conference which then starts a chain reaction. Keep in mind our figures here are approximate.

- 1) The local conference retains 66.1% for its region, including pastoral salaries;
- 2) It sends nine percent to the NPUC for ministry throughout the Northwest, plus another 24.9% to be passed on by the NPUC to the NAD;
- 3) The NPUC passes on the 24.9%, with 9% going to the NAD, 4.35% going to the General Conference for the World Church budget, and 11.4% going to fund defined benefit retirement and health-plan coverage for retirees;

4) A final slice of nearly one percent is sent to the NAD for a special assistance fund to help local conferences that have a low-tithe per-capita ratio or low membership. In the case of Alaska, we receive back about 7.9%. That is about 9% of the total tithe donated by members in Alaska.
