22 MINUTE UBER SERMON

During a recent stay in Denver, I was preparing to head back to Anchorage and decided to book an Uber instead of opting for one of the yellow taxis lined up outside my hotel. To my surprise, every driver rejected my request. As I was about to hail a cab, an Uber driver accepted my ride. During the trip, I struck up a conversation with the driver and shared that I was a pastor in the Adventist church. His expression changed suddenly and I worried that he might have had a negative experience with a Adventist pastor for which I was about to pay the consequences!

"You are a church pastor?" he asked, almost bellowing at me. "Yes," I replied, rather tentatively. "You are a pastor, so you work for God right?" he asked in a more calm voice. "Yes," I responded with a bit more confidence. "Wow, I need to tell you two things. First, I was finished with my shift for the day and on my way home, but I kept noticing for some reason that all the other Uber drivers were rejecting your request, and it seemed strange to me, and for some reason troubled me. So I decided to turn around, accept your request and pick you up. Second, I need to tell you my story. Is that ok?" "Go ahead," I encouraged him.

The driver, Mark, began to open up about his life. He confided that he wasn't a Christian, did not believe in God and had been through a difficult year. He lost loved ones, his job, and suffered a painful break up. The state of politics and the chaos in the nation and around the world only added to his disillusionment. Mark was at his lowest point, struggl-ing with suicidal thoughts.

It was at this point, something out of the ordinary began to happened to him. He was suddenly inundated with thoughts about God, despite never being religious or believing in a higher power. At first, he dismissed these experiences however, over the next few days, he continued hearing a clear voice, delivering an important













message of hope and trust in God's love and care. Mark began to wonder if God could be the solution to his problems and his life, so he decided to drive to one of Denver's highest peaks to talk to God. One day he drove as high as he could up a mountainside and poured his heart out to God.

God responded by saying, "I love you, so trust me; know that the answer to all of your problems is found in and through my son Jesus Christ." To further reinforce this message, God promised to send a representative to communicate with him. Mark then turned and pointed at me and said, "You are God's Messenger!" The immediate thought that crossed my mind was, "Lord have mercy!" Once

I had composed myself, I asked him, "How long do I have?" He responded by inputting the airport address into the GPS and replied, "22 minutes". In those 22 minutes, I delivered a powerful sermon on the second coming of Jesus that resonated with Mark. Once we arrived at the airport, we hugged and thanked one another for the experience, praising God for the divine encounter.

My interaction with Mark was an unforgettable experience I believe was orchestrated by God. It's no secret that God often presents us with opportunities to share His message, whether at home, work, school, or with strangers. As we gear up for our upcoming evangelism events

throughout our vast state of Alaska in 2024, It is my hope and prayer that we remain open to the Holy Spirit's guidance towards these divine appointments. This way, we can fulfill our mission and eagerly await our homecoming with Jesus.

WHAT'S NEXT? 2024 AND BEYOND

As we step into the fall season, let us refocus on evangelism and our mission to serve God in these final days of earth's history. Reaching our communities is a crucial aspect of evangelism, and the conference offers a range of resources to support churches in this effort including training, technology, outreach, and prayer. Here are some of the resources available:

EVANGELISM CALENDAR

Check out the 2023-2024 evangelism calendar in the sidebar on page 4. The calendar details evangelism training and other events. Download your personal copy from the conference website and mark your personal calendar with important training, meetings, and "It Is Written" events.

INTERNET

Many of our churches and hubs outside of Anchorage face internet connectivity issues. To address this, the conference is supporting the purchase of the recently available Starlink system (see page 10 for details). Our goal is to have all our churches across the state be part of and blessed by the "It Is Written" evangelism series and other programs.

EVANGELISM PLAN & BUDGET

To support each church in developing a customized evangelism plan, the conference requests that each board/leadership team draft a 2024 evangelistic strategic and accompanying budget request. The plan and budget must be voted on and approved by your board and submitted to the Office of Administration by November 30, 2023*. In support of the funding request, submit a one or two page summary that details the date, time, and location of the event, the speaker, topic and type

of evangelism effort. Please note that funds are limited, but we will do our best to support churches equitably with what we have.

CREATIVE EVANGELISM

Along with traditional evangelism efforts, creative evangelism ideas are encouraged. The North Pacific Union Conference (NPUC) has made funds available for an evangelism "Shark Tank", which we as a conference are matching, and awarding \$20,000 grants to two Alaska churches. We are looking for creative, innovative, and communityrelevant evangelism concepts that will have a significant impact for Jesus in your community and tie into our conference evangelism plans for next year. The winners will be announced at the pastors/elders meeting in February 2024. The submission deadline is again November 30, 2023*. Please note that these funds are in addition to any budget appropriations that your church may receive.

EVANGELISM PRAYER SABBATHS

Our conference evangelism strategy is "pray, plan, and prepare!" As such, we are designating the first Sabbath of each month as a conference-wide Sabbath in which we ask every church to set apart time during the worship service to pray specifically for the evangelism plans next year. There is supernatural power in prayer, so let's pray together!

IS MENTORING IMPORTANT TODAY?

What is mentorship? "A Christian mentor is known as someone who supports another believer, friend, or fellow worker through a relationship for the purpose of long-term, developmental growth." Christian mentorship is essential for spiritual and professional growth, not only for the mentee but also for the mentor.

Working as a chaplain at a secular university, I enjoyed sharing the word of God with students. One day, the pastor of the church where I worked pulled me into his office and told me that while he loved my passion for reaching out to young people, he would like me to go one step further and duplicate myself. He encouraged me to mentor the Adventist students in our collegiate ministry and teach them how to win souls. I asked myself, "Why would I want to do that?" I wanted to do "my job" efficiently and felt that mentoring would be too time-consuming. He shared examples from scripture when Moses mentored Joshua, and Paul mentored Timothy.



These mentors who took time to train other leaders had a significant impact on the gospel ministry. As I was being mentored, I was also called to mentor others. Eventually taking his advice, I experienced the joy of seeing many of the young people I invested in dedicating their lives to full-time ministry.

Jesus was an expert mentor. He modeled a holistic and practical mentorship relationship with his disciples They travelled with Him learning through their triumphs and mistakes along the way. They heard him pray, watched him heal, listened to him teach, and observed how He treated people. They were present at His death and were witnesses to His resurrection. He invested in each of them as individuals because He loved them. Amongst the twelve, He then took Peter, James, and John aside to be in His inner circle so that they could be prepared for the special leadership roles they would later occupy in the newly beginning church (Mark 9:2-3; Luke 8:49-56.) Before Christ left this earth, He filled them with the power of the Holy Spirit and commissioned them to follow His model of making disciples.

The passing of the mantle of leadership has continued from generation to generation. As His disciples in the present day, we are also commissioned to do the same until He comes again. If there are many examples of mentorship relationships in the Bible for us to follow, why is mentorship so often neglected? Who should be mentors? How can I be a Christian mentor? The Alyeskan will publish a series of future articles on mentorship, that will explore the meaning of mentorship, answer these questions, and help us to learn to be more like Jesus in this way.

PRINCIPALS OF MENTORSHIP

1. A mentor listens.

Listen and try to understand how the other person thinks and feels.

2. A mentor intercedes.

An effective mentor takes that person's needs to God in prayer.

3. A mentor models.

Modeling does not mean perfection, but growth. Let the mentee see your flaws and how to deal with them.

4. A mentor asks questions.

Ask questions to encourage critical thinking and self-reflection. This will elicit feedback and promote disclosure and learning.

5. A mentor teaches.

Teach by sharing joys and concerns, reading, and attending seminars together. Remember, the goal is to transform through prayer and the Holy Spirit.

6. A mentor sets the pace.

Be transparent in your relationship. Model spending quality time with God. Share how you balance life and impart professional skills.

7. A mentor involves others.

Expand the relationship to include other Christians.

8. A mentor gives options, not answers.

Guide decision-making by discussing options, sharing perspectives, and talking through potential consequences allowing the mentee to make the final decision.

DISCIPLESHIP... A YEAR OF SERVICE

Christ's mission was to save the lost and serve humanity. Discipleship offers us the opportunity to partner with Him, guiding and assisting others to a loving and committed relationship with Jesus that also results in them discipling others. This past year, our conference education, youth, young adult (YA), and Pathfinder ministries have received opportunities to spread the love of Christ through discipleship. Here are some of the ways God has been working:

Teachers from across Alaska gathered in February for meetings hosted by the Alaska Conference. Specific emphasis was placed on educators to learn about cultivating and sharing their faith, as well as the best practices for standardsbased learning. Additionally, we were given the opportunity to give back to our community by volunteering at the Food Bank of Alaska. We assisted with the preparation of canned goods for distribution to those in need. Afterwards, we enjoyed a meal together, sponsored by the NPUC Education department. We are incredibly fortunate to have such incredible educators in our conference, who are not only excellent with children. but also dedicated to serving their communities.

In April, we hosted the annual Alaska Conference Youth Rally at Anchorage Junior Academy; this year's theme was "Connections." The speaker, Pastor Ryan Rogers, shared inspiring insights on how to connect with family, friends, the community, and God in today's fastpaced and distracting world. On Sabbath, vouth and leaders took to the streets to spread Christ's love throughout the community. Going door-to-door, offering prayers, and distributing boxes of cookies, they shared a message of hope and goodwill: "We are Adventist Christians, and we give you this gift because God loves you. We are happy to be your neighbor." Additionally, the Anchorage Samoan church's youth worked on a project to help feed the homeless, making this year's event an enriching and meaningful experience for all involved.

ALASKA'S ISOLATED REGION - THE BUSH

Alaska, like Australia and Africa, has a remote and isolated region called "the Bush." This area refers to the part of the state that is not linked by the interconnected road system of North America. Most of Alaska's geography is situated in the Bush and can only be accessed by plane, snowmobile, boat, or dog sled. Bush communities are divided into two subcategories: "hub communities" and "villages." Hubs are larger villages that act as transportation and shipping centers for neighboring communities, providing better access to healthcare, grocery shopping, and other services than smaller Bush villages.

Arctic Mission Adventure (AMA) is a ministry that connects Alaska Native Bush communities with Jesus by meeting their spiritual, physical, and mental needs. To achieve this, AMA has established a church and parsonage in four hub communities. The vision is to develop hubs into robust "centers of influence" through transformative evangelism, as reflected in Christ's ministry on earth. According to Ellen White, "Christ's method alone will give true success in reaching people. The Savior mingled with men as one who

desired their good. He showed His sympathy for them, ministered to their needs, and won their confidence. Then He bade them, 'Follow Me.'... 'Accompanied by the power of persuasion, the power of prayer, the power of the love of God, this work will not, cannot, be without fruit'" (The Ministry of Healing, pp. 143, 144).

To achieve successful evangelism, building a strong foundation that leads to professions of faith is crucial. This can be accomplished through various means, such as formal evangelistic series, community outreach, relational evangelism, and radio messaging. It's critical to balance evangelism with recurrent discipleship, which will help grow and mentor dedicated Native leaders in each hub. These leaders can then effectively carry out evangelism and discipleship in their local and regional spheres of influence.

Our AMA workers are committed opportunities creating environments for people to encounter and experience Jesus Christ. Our evangelism and discipleship core values serve as guiding principles as we build relationships within each community, host Bible studies, share the gospel with strangers and neighbors, and help new believers grow in their faith. We achieve this through a network of supportive ministries that work together to spread the teachings of Christ through radio broadcasting, youth programs, and community-based projects and outreach.

Only when our hubs are developed as productive evangelism and discipleship centers of influence can we then reach out to the smaller surrounding villages to expand our missional footprint.

MISSIONAL DISCIPLESHIP ACROSS GENERATIONS

My classical training is in youth; both from formal education, and practical ministry. Of all the years as a pastor and working for the church, my heart has been with developing youth & young adults to encourage, equip and empower them in their journey to "be the best version of themselves that Jesus has called them to be."

A combination of concepts and practices help young people grow into fully developed disciples for Jesus, within personal development and outward display which could include community and evangelistic focuses.

So, why start an article this way? Because each adult over 40 needs to consider their next phase of discipleship as mentoring the next generation. Each mentor needs to see their focus as carrying the Gospel in and through others. It is still the phase of doing, but never doing ministry alone. Never allowing a niche to be just "mine" or "I just want to be heard". Yes, you can and will be heard, but through the ministry of multigenerational discipleship of younger or less experienced people in the faith.

My current role allows for cross generational ministry and discipleship, albeit not as curriculum heavy as some might like, but yet effective none-theless. My departments of Arctic Mission Adventure, radio broadcasting and camps are a learning lab of leadership and discipleship.

Mission groups from all over the United States bring young and old to work together in a remote Alaskan context: making a difference for the local people as well as directly impacting the participants on the trip.

Youth camps are the most intentionally concentrated learning lab for YAs who are tasked with discipling children ages 6-17 for an 8-12 week period. Both in resident and day camps scenarios, YAs are given the opportunity to deepen their faith and challenge both coworkers and campers to know Jesus and grow in a personal relationship. There is no substitute for the wilderness environment, where staff and campers are unplugged from media, the hustle and bustle of their lives and focused intentionally on Jesus.

It is also an environment that allows for children and YAs to fail forward. If a camper or staff member wants to learn and grow, we work with their teachability. However, If they double down on their "craziness", sometimes there is no choice but to send them home or not invite them back.

We might talk about a safe place to share your feelings as important for kids and adults too. But, it is crucial in today's world that we created complete environments that foster personal spiritual growth and an opportunity for vulnerability to sort out the big issues in life. This is truly missional discipleship and fulfilling the Great Commission of Matthew 18.






STARLINK BRINGS IMPROVED INTERNET TO YOUR CHURCH

In March of 2023, I attended a camp meeting with our congregation in Bethel. While there, I had access to the internet with a download speed of 7 mbps and an upload speed between 1 and 2 mbps. The speed was suitable for emails, but not for video conferencing. However, when I visited again this past September, the church had just installed their Starlink satellite internet dish, which offered much higher speeds (see right).

Why is this important for your church? The conference Evangelism Committee, under Ashwin Somasundrum's leadership, voted to reimburse any church in the conference that wishes to purchase Starlink. The basic home style service dish costs \$600, and the enterprise version costs \$2,500.



The committee has approved reimbursement of up to \$1,000 for the purchase and installation of the basic version and \$1,250 for the enterprise version. The local church is responsible for the ongoing monthly fee, which is currently \$110 per month.

Please send receipts to Nita Larson in treasury, clearly marked "Starlink –Evangelism Reimbursement." We believe this opportunity will be helpful not only for training and potentially live streaming the 2024 evangelism series with John Bradshaw, but also for many other future endeavors.
